Morning and Evening Prayer have a choice of four psalms, and four Bible readings from the Old and New Testaments. These may be used in any combination or followed as a monthly cycle. The psalms and readings are linked to the theme of the day but any other psalms or readings may be used instead.

All psalms are taken from the *New Living Translation* of the Bible or paraphrased by Ray Simpson, apart from Sunday midday prayer and Saturday morning prayer from *The Revised Grail Psalms*, Tuesday evening prayer and Thursday morning prayer from the *USA Book Of Common Prayer*, and Wednesday and Saturday night prayer from *The Orthodox Study Bible*.

All Bible readings are taken from the *New Revised Standard Version*, unless otherwise noted, or paraphrased by the authors of this book.

SUNDAY MORNING PRAYER

Rising from death, today Christ greets his people.

Rising with all creation, we greet you as our King.

There may be singing.

Either

Psalm 24 is said as follows

The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it. The world and all its people belong to him.

For he laid the earth's foundation on the seas and built it on the ocean depths.

Who may climb the mountain of the Lord? Who may stand in his holy place?

Only those whose hands and hearts are pure, who do not worship idols and never tell lies.

They will receive the Lord's blessing and have a right relationship with God their saviour.

Such people may seek you and worship in your presence, O God of Jacob.

Open up, ancient gates! Open up, ancient doors, and let the King of glory enter.

Who is the King of glory? The Lord, strong and mighty; the Lord, invincible in battle. Open up, ancient gates! Open up, ancient doors, and let the King of glory enter.

Who is the King of glory? The Lord of Heaven's Armies—he is the King of glory.

Or

Psalm 57, Psalm 95:1-7, Psalm 100, or the psalm of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme, or any other psalm.

Let us recollect the presence of the Risen Christ with us now.

Short silence

Christ Jesus, in the light of your risen presence, and in union with your first frail apostles, we say sorry for the times when we have failed to follow you:

for not weighing your words, for not sharing your trials, for not believing your promises.

Things for which we are sorry may be recalled aloud or in silence.

Risen Christ, disperse the sin from our souls as the mist departs from the hills.

Be in what we do, inform what we say, redeem who we are. Amen.

Isaiah 25:6-9, Isaiah 35:1-10, Hosea 6:1-6, Micah 6:6-8, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another Old Testament reading.

There may be singing, silence or the following:

We believe, O God of all gods, that you are the eternal God of life.

We believe, O God of all peoples, that you are the eternal God of love.

We believe that you create earth and seas and skies,

we believe that you create us in your image, and give us eternal worth.

Luke 24:1-12, Philippians 3:7-16, Colossians 3:12-17, Revelation 1:12-20, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another New Testament reading.

Jesus says:

I am the resurrection and the life.

You break the power of sin and death.

I am the bread of life.

You feed and fill the hungry.

I am the true vine.

You make empty lives bear fruit.

There may be silence or singing.

Either

Use the following set of prayers pausing after each to invite the Risen Christ into specific situations, perhaps visualising his response.

Risen Christ,

you appeared to Mary in the garden at dawn; Make yourself known to us in the dawnings of our lives.

You appeared to the fishermen as they toiled in vain;

Make yourself known to us in the long hours of our weekly work.

You appeared to the walkers as they welcomed you into their home;

Make yourself known to us in our life journey and make welcoming our homes.

You appeared to Thomas when he touched the scars in your body;

Make yourself known when we touch the wounds of the world.

You appeared to many as they met beneath the skies;

Make yourself known to us in the wonder of your creation.

Or use the following set of prayers in which each of the themes may be used as a starting point for more extended intercessions.

We pray for believers; may their lives be signs of joyful service.

We pray that our churches may bring honour to you;

and healing to the people.

We pray for people in authority; may they strive for justice and peace.

We pray for our communities; may refreshment be found by all who work.

We pray for our homes; may they be places of hospitality and hope.

There may be singing or the Lord's Prayer.

The Father of life go with us. The Risen Christ beside us. The vibrant Spirit within us.

SUNDAY MIDDAY PRAYER

Alleluia. Christ is risen.

Psalm 30:1-5 is said as follows.

I will extol you, LORD, for you have raised me up, and have not let my enemies rejoice over me.

O LORD my God, I cried to you for help, and you have healed me.

Sing psalms to the LORD, you faithful ones; give thanks to his holy name.

His anger lasts a moment; his favour all through life.

At night come tears, but dawn brings joy.

May the abundance and joy of Christ be with us as we meet.

Or

The food which we are to eat is earth, water and sun coming to us through pleasing plants. The food which we are to eat is the fruit of much labour.

We are thankful for it.

May it give us health, strength, joy, and may it increase our love.

Risen Christ of the miraculous catching of fish and the perfect lakeside meal, be with us as we share this meal.

Generous God, as once you multiplied the five loaves and two fishes, multiply the gifts each of us brings that from our sharing together blessings may flow.

I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me.

There may be meditation and singing.

Rejoicing in your new creation, let us pray as you have taught us.

Keep us in the beautiful attitudes, simple, joyful and gentle.

Let us bless the Lord.

Alleluia!

There may be singing.

Either

Psalm 92 is said as follows.

It is good to give thanks to the Lord, to sing praises to the Most High.
It is good to proclaim your unfailing love in the morning, your faithfulness in the evening, accompanied by a ten-stringed instrument, a harp, and the melody of a lyre.

You thrill me, Lord, with all you have done for me!

I sing for joy because of what you have done.
O Lord, what great works you do!
And how deep are your thoughts.

Only a simpleton would not know, and only a fool would not understand this: Though the wicked sprout like weeds and evildoers flourish, they will be destroyed forever.
But you, O Lord, will be exalted forever.
Your enemies, Lord, will surely perish; all evildoers will be scattered.

But you have made me as strong as a wild ox. You have anointed me with the finest oil. My eyes have seen the downfall of my enemies;

my ears have heard the defeat of my wicked opponents.

In the name of Christ. Amen.

Exodus 3:1-15, Isaiah 55:1-13, Ezekiel 47:1-12 Zechariah 10:6-12, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another Old Testament reading.

There may be singing, silence or the following:

Risen Christ, you turned Mary's tears into joy: turn our tears into joy.

Risen Christ, you turned the travellers' despair into hope:

turn our despair into hope.

Risen Christ, you turned the disciples' fears into boldness;

turn our fears into boldness.

Risen Christ, you turned Thomas' unbelief into trust:

turn our unbelief into trust.

John 20:1-18, 1 Corinthians 15:20-28, Hebrews 4:1-11, 1 Peter 1:3-9, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another New Testament reading.

Silent reflection, teaching or singing, or the Magnificat (Song of Mary) may be said as follows.

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour;

he has looked with favour on his lowly servant.

From this day all generations will call me blessed;

the Almighty has done great things for me and holy is his name.

He has mercy on those who fear him, from generation to generation.

He has shown strength with his arm and has scattered the proud in their conceit,

Casting down the mighty from their thrones " and lifting up the lowly.

He has filled the hungry with good things " and sent the rich away empty.

He has come to the aid of his servant Israel, to remember his promise of mercy,

The promise made to our ancestors, to Abraham and his children for ever.

We give you thanks, our Provider, that you are always present, in all things, each day and each night.

We give you thanks for your gifts of creation, life and friendship.

We give you thanks for the particular blessings of this day . . .

Blessings may be named in silence or aloud.

Specific people or situations may be named in each prayer (. . .).

Risen Christ, into your hands we place our families, our neighbours, our fellow believers,

and all with whom we have connected today \dots Risen Christ,

enfold them in your will.

Risen Christ, into your hands we place all who are victims of prejudice, oppression or neglect; the frail, the unwanted . . . Risen Christ,

may everyone be cherished from conception to the grave.

Risen Christ, into your hands we place all who are restless, sick, or prey to the powers of evil

Risen Christ,

tenderly watch over and care for them.

Risen Christ, bring renewal to the land and to the church; to ordained ministries and to religious communities.

Risen Christ,

raise up new callings and communities that meet the need of our times.

There may be singing or the Lord's Prayer.

Lord Jesus Christ, Light of the world, by your cross you have overcome all darkness that oppresses.

Come and shine on us here that we may grow and live together in your love

which makes us one with all humanity.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ,

the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us all evermore. Amen.

SUNDAY NIGHT PRAYER

Risen Saviour, as we settle to rest this night, we rest in the knowledge of your victory over darkness.

Lighten our darkness, as a full moon brightens the darkness of night. Lighten our darkness, as the stars shine in the clear night sky. Lighten our darkness, and bring us peace this night.

Psalm 16 is said as follows.

Keep me safe, O God, for I have come to you for refuge.

I said to the Lord, "You are my Master! Every good thing I have comes from you."

The godly people in the land are my true heroes!
I take pleasure in them!

Troubles multiply for those who chase after other gods.

I will not take part in their sacrifices of blood or even speak the names of their gods.

Lord, you alone are my inheritance, my cup of blessing. You guard all that is mine.

The land you have given me is a pleasant land. What a wonderful inheritance!

I will bless the Lord who guides me; even at night my heart instructs me.

I know the Lord is always with me.
I will not be shaken, for he is right beside me.

No wonder my heart is glad, and I rejoice. My body rests in safety. For you will not leave my soul among the dead

or allow your holy one to rot in the grave.

You will show me the way of life, granting me the joy of your presence and the pleasures of living with you forever.

May that part of me that did not grow at morning, grow at nightfall . . . (Pause.)

The Light of Christ shines upon us this night, driving all darkness from our hearts, our minds, our souls.

The Light of Christ shines upon us this night, bringing the Divine presence with its glorious beams.

1 John 1:1-5 is read.

We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life— this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us— we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son

Jesus Christ. We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete. This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all.

There may be singing, or open or silent prayer

Risen Christ,

Shine upon me this night
that your glory guide me, lead me,
hold me.

Shine upon me this night
that I will be made new.
Shine upon me this night
that others will see you shining from me
as I rise tomorrow.

We end this day knowing Christ's rising, the end of the reign of darkness in our world, in our hearts and in our minds. May Divine Light bathe us in glory and enfold us in love.

MONDAY MORNING PRAYER

God of life, you summon the day to dawn and call us to create with you.

You are the Rock from whom all earth is formed.

You are the Food from whom all souls are fed. You are the Force from whom all powers flow. You are the Source who is creation's head.

There may be singing.

Either

Verses from Psalm 104 are said by alternating voices.

First

Creator God, how great you are! You clothe yourself in light; you stretch out the skies like a tent.

Second

Winds are your messengers, flames are your servants. You water the earth until it gives us food.

First

How abundant are your works, O God, in wisdom have you made them all.

Second

The creatures teeming the earth, the sea, vast and wide - innumerable things, small and great, live within it.

All these look to you for their food in due season.

When you send forth your Spirit they are created and you renew the face of the earth.

First

May your glory last for ever, may you always have joy in what you have created.

Second

May our thoughts always give you pleasure, may we always rejoice in you.

Glory to you, the Source of all being, Eternal Word and Holy Spirit, as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be. Amen.

Or

Psalm 19, Psalm 96, Psalm 148, or the psalm of the day from a lectionary, or any other psalm.

Glory to you, the Source of all being, Eternal Word and Spirit of life, as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be. Amen.

Pause.

Creator and Saviour,
we have exploited earth for our selfish ends,
turned our backs on the cycles of life
and forgotten we are your stewards.
Now soils become barren,

air and water become unclean, species disappear, and humans are diminished. In penitence we come to you.

Pause.

Creator have mercy. **Redeemer have mercy.**Sustainer have mercy.

There may be silence, or a declaration of forgiveness.

Genesis 1:1-5 and 20-31, Job 38:1-30, Isaiah 40:12-23, Jeremiah 10:6-16, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another Old Testament reading.

For earth and sea and sky in the harmony of colour,

we give you thanks, O God.

For the air of the eternal seeping through the physical,

we give you thanks, O God.

For the everlasting glory dipping into time, we give you thanks, O God.

For nature resplendent, growing beasts, emergent crops, the energies of the city,

we give you thanks, O God.

For the Person you sent to restore us when we fell away from the goodness of your creation, we give you thanks, O God.

For harmony restored through your Spirit moving upon the turbulent waters of our lives,

we give you thanks, O God.

For the honour you give us of lives that flow in the rhythm of your tides,

we give you thanks, O God.

For setting each of us, like the stars upon their courses, within the orbit of your love, we give you thanks, O God.

Matthew 6:25-34, Acts 14:8-18, Colossians 1:9-20, Revelation 22:1-7, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another New Testament reading.

This may be followed by teaching, creative activity or the following.

This we know, the earth does not belong to us; the earth is God's and we will serve it.

This we know, we did not weave the web of life;

the earth is God's and we will serve it.

Whatever befalls the earth befalls the sons and daughters of the earth;

the earth is God's and we will serve it.

The following prayers may be used.

Caring Father God, we offer to you the fuels and forests, the seas and soil, the air and animals, the textiles and technology of the world.

May we joy in your creation and steward it for future generations.

Worker Christ, we offer to you our workplace, may we embody your presence in it.
Grace us to speak your peace and perfect order into its atmosphere.

May we know your wisdom in all that will be thought, decided and accomplished.

Give us a fresh inspiration of truth and beauty on which to draw as we work.

Energising Spirit, we offer to you our caring professions, our emergency services, our charities and voluntary helpers, and all in need of your healing love.

May this day be graced by our attentive presence, our careful listening and our loving service.

There may be open prayer.

In our dependence on the God of life, may we cherish the precious earth; the earth of the God of life, the earth of the Christ of love, the earth of the Spirit Holy.

God bless the sky that is above us, the earth that is beneath us, your image deep within us, the day that lies before us.

MONDAY MIDDAY PRAYER

Great Spirit, whose breath is felt in the soft breeze,

and whose life surges through socket and screen;

we seek your strength in the midst of the day. May we, and the peoples of the world, work in dignity and walk in the beauty of the day.

Blessed be God the birther of life. Blessed be God the giver of light. Blessed be God the bestower of skills.

Psalm 67 is said as follows, or another psalm.

May God be merciful and bless us.

May his face smile with favour on us.

May your ways be known throughout the earth,

your saving power among people everywhere.

May the nations praise you, O God. Yes, may all the nations praise you.

Then the earth will yield its harvests, and God, our God, will richly bless us. **Yes, God will bless us,**

Yes, God will bless us, and people all over the world will fear him.

O Son of God, change our hearts. Your Spirit composes the songs of the birds, your creation is billions of wondrous miracles. Your creation is beautiful to look upon. We ask of you just one more miracle: beautify our souls.

O God, you called all life into being; your presence is around us now, your Spirit enlivens all who work.

May your kingdom come on earth.

Impart to us wisdom to understand your ways, to manage well the tasks of this day.

Make us co-creators with you that when day fades we may come to you without shame.

We pray for this world you have given us; for the planting of seeds and for the nurturing of life in the soils and commerce of the world. Sustain those who extract minerals, create textiles, farm the land or develop technology. Encircle those who can neither sow nor reap because human ills have drained them.

Listen to the words of Christ:

Happy you who are gentle; the earth belongs to you. *Matthew 5:5*

You will labour,
but God will bless your work.
You will walk,
but God will bless your footsteps.
You will suffer,
but God will bless your tears.

Dwelling in the earth are the seeds of all. **Dwelling in the soul is the Son of God.**

There may be singing or free prayer.

Bless all work done today
that enables the human family
to be clothed, fed and housed,
to travel and learn,
to communicate respectfully
and exchange wisely,
to craft and celebrate,
in everything reflecting your glory.
Good God, be with us in every experience of
life.

There may be singing.

May you, our God, who dances with creation, plants your likeness in all people, and works to restore all things, send us out to fill the world with love.

Amen.

MONDAY EVENING PRAYER

We bless you, O God and forget not all your benefits.

We bless you for your creation which is alive with your glory.

You nod and beckon to us through every stone and star.

As the sun sets in the west may we settle down with you.

There may be singing or else silent reflection on God's creation.

Either

Verses from Psalm 50 are said as follows.

The mighty God calls to the earth from sun's rising to its sleep.
God the Eternal Source shines forth perfect in glorious beauty.

With fiery skies and raging storms God calls to heaven, to earth: 'Bring to me those faithful souls who give their hearts to me.'

The Mighty God requires our eyes and beckons us to listen:
'You cannot earn a place near me, for all that lives is mine:

The cattle on a thousand hills, the wildlife, trees and birds. If I hungered, I'd not tell you for all that lives is mine. So call to me in trial, in joy, and give to me your thanks. Worship by the way you live; let gratitude abound.'

Glory to you, the Source of all being, Eternal Word and Holy Spirit, as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be. Amen.

Or

Psalm 29, Psalm 65, Psalm 136:1-9, or the psalm of the day from a lectionary, or any other psalm.

Glory to you, the Source of all being, Eternal Word and Spirit of life, as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be. Amen.

Genesis 2:4-9 and 18-25, Genesis 9:8-17, Isaiah 65:17-25, Hosea 2:14-23, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another Old Testament reading.

There may be silence.

Lord, you are my island,
in your bosom I nest.
You are the calm of the sea,
in that peace I rest.
You are the waves on the shore's glistening stones,
their sound is my hymn.

You are the song of the birds,

their tune I sing.
You are the sea breaking on rock,

I praise you with the swell.
You are the ocean that laps my being,
in you I dwell.

Mark 4:26-32, Luke 8:22-25, Acts 17:16-31, Romans 8:18-30, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another New Testament reading.

There may be silence or teaching, or the following.

We bless you, Lord, for the beauty of the trees, the softness of the air, the fragrance of the grass.

We bless you, Lord, for the soaring of the skies, the rhythms of the earth, the stillness of the night.

We bless you, Lord, for the twinkling of the stars, the freshness of the morning, the dewdrops on the flower.

We bless you, Lord, for the taste of good food, the trail of the sun, and the life that never goes away.*

We give thanks for the moments of creation and grace we have seen in this day . . . (Examples may be named)

Generosity of God, spilling over into creation, we bless you for flowers and their wealth of beauty,

for creatures and their glorious variety, for seas and seasons and scents.

May we, too, reflect something of your glorious generosity.

We pray for the well-being of the creation, the healthfulness of the air, the richness of the earth and its provisions, and the beauty of the whole world.

Creator, make us co-workers with you that the earth and all who live upon it may reap a full harvest.

Show us how to reflect your rhythms in our life and work and to conserve the world's rich resources.

Help us to give all creatures their due respect, to tend cattle and crops with care.

Guide science along wise and considerate ways that we may fashion agriculture that truly enhances and that we may sustain a vibrant environment.

May we too shine with the vibrancy of your love.

Peace to the land and all that grows on it.

Peace to the sea and all that swims in it.

Peace to the air and all that flies through it.

Peace with our God who calls us to serve.

MONDAY NIGHT PRAYER

As the light fades and the work of the day is done, as the flowers and the laptops close, as the sun goes down and the world becomes still let us draw near to the Son of God.

Lord God, King of the Universe Blessed be all creation, for all life comes from you. Blessed be the earth, may it support our bed tonight.

There may be singing or playing of a creation themed song.

Psalm 121 is said as follows.

I look up to the mountains—
does my help come from there?
My help comes from the Lord,
who made heaven and earth!

He will not let you stumble; the one who watches over you will not slumber.

Indeed, he who watches over Israel never slumbers or sleeps.

The Lord himself watches over you!

The Lord stands beside you as your protective shade.

The sun will not harm you by day, nor the moon at night.

The Lord keeps you from all harm and watches over your life.

The Lord keeps watch over you as you come and go, both now and forever.

We give you thanks that you are always present, in all things, each day and each night. We give you thanks for your gifts of creation, life and friendship.

We give you thanks for the blessings of this day . . .

(Blessings may be named in silence or aloud.)

When we are calm and still we can sense you, our Maker, we can feel your presence with us. All that has been made stirs within us creation's song of praise.

We give you thanks for work completed. We give you thanks for rest at night.

Isaiah 40:28-31 is read.

Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth.

He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable.

He gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless.

Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted; but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength,

they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint. Guardian of the planets, Kindler of the stars, we pass into the darkness encompassed by you.

There may be silence or singing, or a pause to reflect upon the past day.

We offer you our concerns and the needs of your creation.

There may be open prayer for the needs of creation and current ecological issues.

Thank you for your love for us, strong and nurturing;

we give back our lives to you.

Thank you for our minds, bodies and souls; we give back our lives to you.

Thank you for the past day;
we give back our lives to you.
After creating all things God rested;
we give back our lives to you.

Protect us through the hours of this night, be they silent or stormy, that we who are wearied by the changes and chances of a restless world may rest upon you eternally.

You created the world out of love; we return love to you. Let us rest in God this night and awake in newness of life. Amen.

TUESDAY MORNING PRAYER

Glory to the Most High God who has come to live among us,

Candles may be lit.

Psalm 82 is said as follows.

Give justice to the weak and the orphan; maintain the right of the lowly and the destitute.

Rescue the weak and the needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked."

They have neither knowledge nor understanding, they walk around in darkness; all the foundations of the earth are shaken. I say, "You are gods,

children of the Most High, all of you; nevertheless, you shall die like mortals, and fall like any prince."

Rise up, O God, judge the earth; for all the nations belong to you!

Glory to the Father, to the Son, and to the Spirit, one God who mothers us all.

Or

Psalm 48, Psalm 99, Psalm 146 or the psalm of the day from a lectionary, or any other psalm.

Glory to the Birther, the Brother, and the Breather, one God who mothers us all.

We offer to you, Lord, the troubles of this day; we lay down our burdens at your feet.

There may be a pause.

Forgive us our sins, give us your peace, and help us to receive your Word.

In the name of Christ. Amen.

Isaiah 2:1-4, Leviticus 19:9-18, Isaiah 56:1-8, Zephaniah 3:8-13, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another Old Testament reading.

Triune God, nurture the people through your Church.

Through her pastors, nourish us.

Through her teachers, establish us.

Through her prophets, envision us.

Through her musicians, inspire us.

Through her saints, sanctify us.

Through her givers, bless us.

Mark 3:31-35, Romans 12:9-21, Ephesians 4:1-16, James 3:13-18, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another New Testament reading.

There may be meditation and singing.

Lord Christ, you prayed for the unity of all who believe:

may your churches rejoice in the communion of heaven and attain communion round one table on earth.

Lord Christ, you call us to love our neighbours: may we and our local communities seek the common good.

Lord Christ, through bread and wine you give us signs of your Presence transforming all creation:

may we and those in the media glimpse this vision, and reflect it to the world.

We pray for reconciliation to be experienced and memories healed in all parts of the universal Church.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us all evermore. Amen.

There may also be free prayer or the following.

O God, grant us unity.
Bless the oppressed, bless the oppressor.
Draw all people home to you.

Pause.

Deliver the downtrodden, pity the unnoticed. Raise the fallen, show yourself to the needy.

Pause.

Heal the sick, bring back those who have strayed.

Pause.

Feed the hungry, lift up the weak. Remove the prisoners' chains.

Pause.

May every people come to know that you are God, that Christ is your Child, that we are your people.

There may be singing.

Jesus Christ, Light of the world, by your cross you have overcome all darkness that oppresses.

Come and shine on us in our communities, that we may grow and live together in your love, which makes us one with all humanity.

THURSDAY NIGHT PRAYER

Three candles may be lit as the following words are said by one or three people.

I light a light in the name of the Father who embraces us.

I light a light in the name of the Son who enfolds us.

I light a light in the name of the Spirit who encircles us.

Our God is One, the God from whom all people come, one earth is the bed on which we make our home, one is the air that all creatures breathe.

Mighty One,
I give you thanks with my whole heart.
Great are your works:
all who sense their wonder study them.
Your work overflows with majesty and honour and your righteousness lasts for ever.
You are gracious and full of mercy.
You provide food for those who honour you.
You are faithful and just in all you do.
Reverence for you is the beginning of wisdom; all those who practise it have good understanding.

From Psalm 111

There may be singing or music.

We thank you for your presence through the day and for friends who have helped us on our way.

As shadows fall and the wheels of the world grow still, forgive us for our failures in love.

Visit the place in which we rest this night and drive away all that would harm.

May holy angels preserve us in peace.

Support us, Lord, through life's troubles each day, until the shadows lengthen and evening comes, the fever of life is over and our work is done. Then, Lord, in your mercy, give us a holy rest, and peace at the last.

There may be silence.

1 Peter 3:8-12 is read.

Finally, all of you, have unity of spirit, sympathy, love for one another, a tender heart, and a humble mind. Do not repay evil for evil or abuse for abuse; but, on the contrary, repay with a blessing. It is for this that you were called—that you might inherit a blessing. For 'Those who desire life and desire to see good days, let them keep their tongues from evil and their lips from speaking deceit; let them turn away from evil and do good; let them seek peace and pursue it. For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous, and his ears are open to their prayer. But the face of the Lord is against those who do evil.'

Either of the following sets of prayers may be used.

On your world, Lord,
your love descend this night.
On your Church, Lord,
your love descend this night.
On all who work, Lord,
your love descend this night.
Where there is strife, Lord,
your love descend this night.
Where there is neglect, Lord,

God with us lying down, God with us rising up. Christ with us sleeping, Christ with us waking. Spirit with us now, Spirit with us evermore. Amen.

FRIDAY MORNING PRAYER

On this day of Christ's suffering and death, let us be one with him in his wounds.

We seek to tread in the steps of Christ, in the steps of Christ, our Champion and King, who has shown us the way, when strong, when weak.

Confession is made in silence, or as follows.

Forgive us;

for our selfish deeds, our empty speech, and the words with which we have wounded.

Pause

Forgive us;

for our false desires,

our vengeful attitudes and for what we have left untended.

Pause

Holy Jesus, hanged on a tree, victorious over death; forgive us for these sins, free us from these evils

There may be singing.

and power us into new ways.

Genesis 22 1-14, Isaiah 53:1-12, Hosea 14:1-7, Micah 7:18-20, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another Old Testament reading.

Jesus, Saviour of the world, come to us in your mercy.

We look to you to save and help us.

By your Cross and life laid down you set your people free.

We look to you to save and help us.

When your disciples were about to perish you reached down and saved them.

We look to you to come to our help.

In the greatness of your mercy, free us from our chains.

Forgive the sins of all your people.

Come now, and dwell with us, Lord Christ

Jesus.

Hear our prayer and be with us always.

And when you come in your glory, make us to be one with you and to share the life of your kingdom.

Mark 10:35-45, 1 Corinthians 1:18-25, Colossians 2:6-15, 1 John 1:5-2:2, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another New Testament reading.

There may be silence.

Jesus, broken on the Cross, we bring to you those suffering from broken dreams, broken relationships and broken promises . . . (Pause or give names.) Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on them.

Jesus, who lost everything, we bring to you those who have suffered loss of work, mobility and well-being . . . (Pause or give names.)

Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on them.

Jesus, defenceless victim, we bring to you those who are victims of violence, abuse and false accusation . . . (Pause or give names.)

Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on them.

Jesus, alone and destitute, we bring to you those who are lonely, homeless and hungry . . . (Pause or give names.)

Lord Jesus Christ,

have mercy on them.

Saviour, you died that we may be brought back to you, turn the hearts of those who do not yet know you . . . (Pause, or give names)

Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on them.

The Lord's Prayer may be said.

There may be singing.

May the Christ who walks with wounded feet walk with us on the road.

May the Christ who serves with wounded hands stretch out our hands to serve.

May the Christ who loves with wounded heart open our hearts to love.

FRIDAY MIDDAY PRAYER

Jesus, Master Carpenter of Nazareth, who, through wood and nails, won our full salvation, wield well your tools in this, your workshop, that we who come to you rough-hewn may here be fashioned into a truer beauty by your hand.*

Psalm 31:1-5 is read as follows.

O Lord, I have come to you for protection; don't let me be disgraced. Save me, for you do what is right.

Turn your ear to listen to me; rescue me quickly.

Be my rock of protection, a fortress where I will be safe.

You are my rock and my fortress.

Lord Jesus, at this hour you hung on the cross, stretching out your arms in love to all.

May the peoples of the world be drawn to your uplifted love, especially those with whom we shall work this day.

Give us the will to share our bread with the hungry,

to give room to those who feel rejected, and to reach out to those in need.

We pray for those whose tasks are backbreaking, whose bodies are enslaved or whose spirits are crushed.

There may be silence in which we hold before the cross those for whom we pray.

These words of Jesus are said.

Happy you who hunger for justice; you will be filled.
Happy you who show mercy; you will receive mercy.
Happy you who weep; you will laugh.

Matthew 5:4, 6, 7

There may be singing.

Lord Jesus, in the midst of malice and mockery you found peace to remain in your Father's will.

When we are mocked or maligned, give us peace to remain in our Father's will.

The Lord's Prayer is said in the traditional form or as follows.

Our Father in heaven,
honoured be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done
on earth, as in heaven.
Give us this day our daily supplies
and forgive us our sins,
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into time of trial,
but deliver us from evil.
For yours is the kingdom, the power and
the glory,
for ever and ever.
Amen.

He forgives all my sins and heals all my diseases.

He redeems me from death and crowns me with love and tender mercies.

He fills my life with good things. My youth is renewed like the eagle's!

The Lord gives righteousness and justice to all who are treated unfairly.

He revealed his character to Moses and his deeds to the people of Israel.

The Lord is compassionate and merciful, slow to get angry and filled with unfailing love.

He will not constantly accuse us, nor remain angry forever.

He does not punish us for all our sins; he does not deal harshly with us, as we deserve.

For his unfailing love toward those who fear him

is as great as the height of the heavens above the earth.

He has removed our sins as far from us as the east is from the west.

A Kyrie ('Lord, have mercy') may be sung.

Luke 23:32-43, 2 Corinthians 5:11-21, Hebrews 2:10-18, Revelation 5:1-14, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another Old Testament reading.

There may be meditation or singing.

Lord Jesus, you died to save us, not from suffering, but from ourselves; not from injustice, but from being unjust. You died that we might live as you did, who died to yourself.

In union with witnesses and martyrs of Christ; in communion with all who have died in the faith of Christ, we commit ourselves to our living God.

As we seek to be faithful to you and struggle to establish justice, we bring to you those who are in chains.

Pause or free prayer

We bring to you people who are persecuted or oppressed, the homeless, the hungry and those in grinding poverty.

Pause or free prayer

We bring to you those who are abused, belittled or marginalised.

Pause or free prayer

We bring to you those who are in pain behind closed doors.

Pause or free prayer

We bring to you those who are locked into hatred;

Pause or free prayer

We bring to you all the world for which you died.
Christ, victorious over evil, fill their hearts and ours with generous love.

There may be singing.

We go in the sign of the Cross of Christ (+ make sign).

The Cross above us to lead us through, the Cross before us to keep us true, the Cross behind us to shield us from ill, this day and always. Amen.

FRIDAY NIGHT PRAYER

Shadows darken this day;
the day Christ was laid in a grave.
The darkness shall not engulf us;
for with you the darkness is light.
Lord, by your Cross and precious death;
save us from the powers of evil,
save us from another's harm,
save us from our selfish failings,
come this night and give us calm.

There may be singing.

Psalm 90:1–12 is read as follows, or verses from another psalm.

Lord, through all the generations you have been our home!
Before the mountains were born, before you gave birth to the earth and the world,

from beginning to end, you are God.

You turn people back to dust, saying, "Return to dust, you mortals!"
For you, a thousand years are as a passing day,

as brief as a few night hours.

You sweep people away like dreams that disappear.

They are like grass that springs up in the morning.

In the morning it blooms and flourishes, but by evening it is dry and withered. We wither beneath your anger; we are overwhelmed by your fury. You spread out our sins before you—our secret sins—and you see them all. We live our lives beneath your wrath, ending our years with a groan.

have mercy on all who are betrayed.

People may mention, in silence or aloud, those who need our prayers.

Shield and deliver them and look on them with your merciful gaze.

There may be singing.

Jesus said: 'Father into your hands I entrust my spirit';

Father into your hands we entrust our spirits.
Father, as we sit at the foot of the cross,
Father, into your hands we entrust our spirits.

Either

Simeon's song may be sung as the hymn 'Faithful Vigil Ended.'

Faithful vigil ended, watching, waiting cease; Master, grant your servant his discharge in peace.

All the Spirit promised, all the Father willed, now these eyes behold it perfectly fulfilled.

This your great deliverance sets your people free;
Christ their light uplifted all the nations see.

Christ, your people's glory! watching, doubting cease: grant to us your servants our discharge in peace.*

Or

It may be said as follows

Lord, you now have set your servant free to go in peace as you have promised.

For these eyes of mine have seen the Saviour whom you have prepared for all the world to see;

A light to reveal you to the nations and the glory of your people.

O Christ who at this evening hour rested in the tomb

and made it become a bed of hope, visit this place tonight, that we may pass through the death of sleep and rise from our beds in hope of life eternal. Lord, give us a peaceful night and prepare us for a good ending to life.

I make the sign of the Cross of Christ (+make sign); my Christ, my Shield, my Saviour; each day, each night, in light, in dark, my Treasure, my dear One, my eternal home. Amen.

On the roads, your kingdom come.

Online, your kingdom come.

In . . . (other activities may be named), your kingdom come.

In each thing we do this day, your kingdom come.

Give us this day our daily supplies and forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours, now and for ever.

Amen.

There may be singing.

May we do this day on earth as the saints do in heaven.

May we live this day in your light and walk in the hope of your kingdom.

Isaiah 32:1-8, Jeremiah 23:1-8, Amos 9:11-15 Zechariah 8:1-8 and 20-23, or the reading of the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another Old Testament reading.

If our mouths were as full of song as the sea, our tongues with joyful sounds like the roar of its waves, our lips with praise like the outspread sky,

we still could not thank you enough for the good you have done to us and our forebears.

If our eyes were shining like the sun and the moon, our hands stretched out like eagles' wings in the air, our feet as swift as the wild deer,

we still could not thank you enough, Yahweh, for the good you have done to us and our forebears.

You rescued us from the tyrant, you freed us from slavery.

In times of famine you fed us, in times of plenty you built us up.

From violence you delivered us, from plagues you saved us.

Therefore to you who breathed life into us we shall give praise with all our breath, honour with all our memory, worship with all our being.*

Matthew 25:31-46, Colossians 3:1-4, Hebrews 12:18-28, Revelation 1:1-8, or the reading of

the day from a lectionary or reading scheme; or another New Testament reading.

There may be meditation or singing.

God of the call, as we give thanks for the saints we pray for those who feel thwarted in their vocation;

may they do on earth as the saints do in heaven.

God from whom all truth and justice flow, we pray for the rule of law to prevail; may we do on earth as the saints do in heaven.

God of resurrection, in their worship may our churches bring honour to you, joy to the people, and healing to the land; may they do on earth as the saints do in heaven.

There may be open prayer and singing.

Let us bless the Lord.

Yours, O Lord, are the greatness, the power, the glory, the victory, and the majesty, for ever and ever. Amen.

SATURDAY NIGHT PRAYER

On occasions when Saturday Night Prayer is extended as a night vigil the reading for Sunday's main worship may be read and pondered, or there may be the slow, thoughtful repetition of the Jesus Prayer, 'Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy.'

Eternal Creator of the weeks and years, as this week draws to a close,

draw close to us as we draw close to you. Eternal Creator of the days and nights, as darkness deepens,

draw near to us as we draw near to you.

Most merciful God, we confess to you before the company of heaven and one another that we have sinned in thought, word and deed, and in what we have failed to do.

Forgive us our sins, heal us by your Spirit and raise us to new life in Jesus Christ.

Psalm 119:52–62 or another section of the psalm is read.

I remembered your judgments of old, O Lord, and I was comforted.

Despondency held me because of sinners who abandon your law.

Your ordinances were sung to me In the place of my dwelling.

I remembered your name in the night, O Lord, and I kept your law.

This happened to me in the night, because I searched your ordinances.

You are my portion, O Lord; I said I will keep your law. I sought your presence with my whole heart; have mercy on me according to your teaching.

I considered your ways, and I turned my feet toward your testimonies. I prepared myself, and I was not troubled, that I might keep your commandments.

The ropes of sinners ensnared me, but I did not forget your law.
At midnight I arose to give thanks to you because of the judgments of your righteousness.

The following may be sung to the traditional tune, or said:

Before the ending of the day, creator of the world, we pray, that you, with steadfast love, would keep your watch around us while we sleep.

From evil dreams defend our sight, from fears and terror of the night; tread under foot our deadly foe, that we no sinful thought may know.

O Father, what we ask be done, through Jesus Christ, your only Son and Holy Spirit, by whose breath, our souls are raised to life from death.

Amen.

Hebrews 3:12–4:1 or another passage is read.

Take care, brothers and sisters, that none of you may have an evil, unbelieving heart that turns away from the living God. But exhort one another every day, as long as it is called 'today', so that none of you may be hardened by the deceitfulness of sin. For we have become partners of Christ, if only we hold our first confidence firm to the end. As it is said, 'Today, if you hear his voice, do not harden your hearts as in the rebellion.' Now who were they who heard and yet were rebellious? Was it not all those who left Egypt under the leadership of Moses? But with whom was he angry for forty years? Was it not those who sinned, whose bodies fell in the wilderness? And to whom did he swear that they would not enter his rest, if not to those who were disobedient? So we see that they were unable to enter because of unbelief. Therefore, while the promise of entering his rest is still open, let us take care that none of you should seem to have failed to reach it.

There may be silence.

In our tiredness be our Rest, in our stumbling be our Shield.

Into our place of darkness, into our place of strife, into our fears and worries, come with eternal life.

Let us bring before God the concerns of this

day. (These may be mentioned aloud or in silence.)

There may be singing or silence.

When we neglect you,
remind us of your presence;
when we are frightened,
give us courage;
when we are tempted,
give us the power to resist;
when we are anxious and worried,
give us peace;
when we are weary in service,
renew our tired frame.

Jesus,
Leader of apostles,
Teacher of evangelists,
Strength of martyrs,
Friend of the poor,
Crown of saints,
lead us through the night into a day of renewal.

May we rest secure in your love-and rise up to serve you with joy. Come with the breaking of the day and meet us in the breaking of bread. Amen.
